The Duchess of Kent and a packed centre court saw South African heroine Sandra Reynolds suffer the gloom of eclipse by Miss Bueno whose feline grace made her a joy to behold.

Yet for ten games of the singles final Miss Reynolds hovered on the brink of a major upset and Miss Bueno said later "She hit very hard and gave me a lot of trouble. I would much rather have played someone like Christine Truman who makes mis-takes."

Could the wave of a magic wand have transposed the two girls services, then Miss Reynolds must surely have won. When receiving she normally needed five shots of the rally to restore equality of position.

When serving, a fault inevitably meant she would play her next shot under great pressure and with Miss Bueno menacing her from the net.

Miss Reynolds also lost many opportunities of harrassing Miss Bueno by her failure to move up to the net behind the deep, forceful drives, which were the basis of her strength.

The absence of this threat gave Miss Bueno time to manoeuvre for position and, in the late stages, to delay her own volleying attacks till the most advantageous moments. Nevertheless, the match remained open until the nine deuce third game of the second set in which Miss Reynolds missed a sitter for 1-2 with Miss Bueno moving in the wrong direction.

Though she never ceased trying, Miss Reynolds became steoreotyped and Miss Bueno played with the happy knowledge that she commanded the rallies. In particular, her sweetly flowing backhand drives swept the ball from side to side and her volleys—she always seemed to be in the right position-met the returns squarely and solidly in the middle of the racket.

Six minutes later Miss Reynolds lobbed out under the pressure of a smash and Miss Bueno remained Queen of Wimbledon.

Yet for one set she had been a bit shaky if not a downright nervous Queen, who had

known for the first time in a fortnight the strain of defending against the barrage of thundering drives which Miss Reynolds flung at her hapless victims of earlier

Miss Bueno's early 3-1 lead had been neutralised by a series of speedy, accurate, passing shots and a couple of double-faults through footfaulting-told of her struggles.

Miss Bueno showed a champions mettle as the set moved into the ninth game. Her powerful first service gained in accuracy. Her drives probed unexpected angles as she moved Miss Reynolds around the court in preparation for advances to the net. And her volleys sped unerringly for the gaps so created.

Miss Reynolds clung on to six all but that was the very limit of her capabilities.

In the doubles the young Springboks fought gamely for eight games of the first set. Then the solid, two up net attack of Miss Bueno and Miss Hard appeared to dishearten them and they fell away badly at the end.

Britain, too, knew the pangs of disappointment with the defeat of the Davis Cup pair Michael Davies and Bob Wilson by Dennis Ralston and Rafael Osuna 7-5 6-3 10-8.

Davies struggled manfully to hold the team together but the only hope of success lay with Wilson's ability to take over con-trol. This, neither his form nor Osuna's rapid reflexes and fertile imagination, permitted.

Perhaps the most shattering surprise was the failure of Davies and Wilson to watch their opponents in pre-final matches, a course that would have suggested several ways in which the adventurous might have been constrained if not tamed.

The greater flexibility of the younger couple was also apparent, especially in their willingness to receive service two back when there was danger of interception from the server's partner.

MARIA BUENO-A Profile

YOU'RE not a real champion until you've won Wimbledon twice"—so they say, and if there was ever any doubt about the claim of Maria Esther Bueno to the title of champion, she dispelled it once and for all on July 2 against Sandra Reynolds. Yet it is not the fact that she wins, but the manner of winning that makes every match of Maria Bueno's memorable. Grace, artistry, sparkle—if anyone complains that Wimbledon lacks these nowadays, he need only watch Maria.


So dominant is she today that it is hard to remember that this petite, striking Brazilian made her international debut as re-cently as 1958. Rome that year showed the shape of things to come—even though Ann Haydon and a damp court prevented Maria from winning Wimbledon at her first attempt. But even then, at 18, her dazzling quality was unmistakable. Her strokes bore the stamp of genius and her court personality was just as dynamic. Even had her tennis been of the out-first-round standard, her lovely figure, her gracefulness and her Latin sparkle would have brought the crowds flocking.

Maria Bueno's tennis skill, you might think, leaves little room for anything else. But before she began touring the world, she qualified fully as a teacher, following a rigorous schedule of study and tennis practice that would have seemed impossible to a lesser person. She lives in Sao Paulo and is devoted to her home and family especially to her brother Pedro. When both are at home—he is at Lamar College in Texas—they are inseparable and share everything together. To her fellow Brazilians, Maria is a national heroine-and surely one of her proudest moments must have been when, after her 1959 Wimbledon win, she was presented with the freedom of the city of Sao Paulo.

It's easy to sneer at Wimbledon's fashion and frills. But Maria has proved once and for all that a girl can bring real glamour to tennis in two ways—her beautiful highfashion dresses only enhance the glories of her backhand. And if ever there was an inspired choice of colour for a champion, it was the royal purple which Maria wore so magnificently on the Centre Court this

Volatile, explosive, temperamental — Maria is all these things, but they spring Volatile, from her Latin origin, and anyone who meets her is invariably won over by her utter naturalness and charm. And from the viewpoint of tennis, the player who has a fiery temperament, but keeps it completely under control, will be the greatest cham-pion of all. After 1960 let no-one deny that Maria Bueno belongs to that select bandshe is one of the very few, the champions who can rise to and transcend the really important occasion. Earlier in the season Maria lost in Australia to Jan Lehane and Margaret Smith; Darlene Hard beat her easily in Paris. But when Wimbledon came along, it was a Bueno in the full force of her brilliance and majesty who kept the crowds spellbound.

Twenty years ago, the tiny baby Maria Esther was wheeled daily in her pram through the Sao Paulo tennis club opposite her home. Then as now tennis was her life. And today, tennis fans all over the world can only say, "Bueno! Bueno! Bueno!"







Small points, perhaps, but points which might have added confidence and so saved Davies' service in the last game but one, his first loss in four matches.

As in their semi-final, Osuna proved the dominant partner because of his variety of stroke and speed of racket work. Of all his shots perhaps his volley lobs were the most spectacular, though a few short ones endangered his own and Ralston's safety.

Bob Howe appeared to be helping Miss Bueno to her third title when, after a spectacular run of play against Rod Laver and Mise Hard, they reached 5-2 in the third set.

Then Miss Hard suddenly fled from the court without a word to anyone. Upon return six minutes later, Miss Hard found new certainty and went on to retain the title. Rule 30 permits a player to leave court under certain circumstances providing the umpire permits. Satisfied that her plight was genuine, Col. Legg did not disqualify Miss Hard on the technical point of failing to obtain permission.

The match ended with Howe half volleying into the net but subsequent events suggest it will not be the last shot of an all amateur Wimbledon.

Judy Fallon reports from London

"The Dior of The Centre Court"

THEY call him "The Dior of the Centre Court" and certainly his designs are every bit as revolutionary as those of the late Christian D. "He" is, of course, Colonel Teddy Tinling, the six-foot Czar of Wimbledon fashion, whose tennis dresses—and, of course, those frilly panties—have been worn by Top People on Top Courts for many a year.

The first tennis dress he designed was "way back" in 1937 during the Alice Marble era. This was for the volatile Suzanne Lenglen, who told him: "Make me a tennis dress that is feminine, and give it some glamour instead of all this masculinity."

But it was "Gorgeous Gussy Moran" who really brought Teddy Tinling's designs out into the blazing limelight of the Centre Court. Her frilly panties made fashion history.

The controversy that raged over these frillies put Gussy and Teddy Tinling on the front pages of newspapers all over the world, and soon every fashion-conscious tennis star was begging "T.T." to design her Wimbledon outfits.

That was when Colonel Tinling won his "Dior of the Centre Court" accolade. So great was the demand for his designs that his Sportswear achieved what is really couture standing.

With all T.T.'s wealth of glamour and fol-de-rol, it is sometimes forgotten that Wimbledon champions wouldn't dream of wearing impractical clothes for their big matches, no matter how pretty they were. Tinling's designs are a remarkably shrewd blending of nonsense and practicability, and although it is the nonsense that gets him the headlines, it is the practicality that get him the customers (and incidentally, keeps them!).

He has an impressive list of "firsts" in sportswear:

Frills, of course, and the general feminine trends of tennis clothes with broderie anglaise, coloured embroideries, frilly petticoats and trimmings. His tennis range was the first I ever saw to use Nylon and he experimented with permanent pleats in Terylene long before anyone else.

He introduced washable gold embroidery to give a 22 carat glitter to the courts.

He quickly saw the sportswear possibilities of the chemise, trapeze, and tabard lines put forward by Paris couturiers and translated them into tennis terms.

He was the first sportswear designer to trim his creations with mink! (though he does not consider this suitable for Wimbledon).

He dreamed up (in conjunction with a Mayfair hairdresser) the brilliant idea of "Wigs for Wimbledon." These were featherweight affairs weighing only 2 oz. and meant that if a Wimbledon star felt her hairstyle wasn't quite up to the limelight all she had to do was don her Tinling transformation—and hey presto!

And the top stars don't get only their tennis dresses from him either. When Maureen Connolly was getting married in America she wrote to Teddy Tinling and asked him to design and make her wedding dress and airmail it to her all the way to California.

The dress, in white nylon lace, had a petal skirt, because one of the lucky tennis dresses he had made for her and in which she won Wimbledon had a similar skirt!


